History of BNAA

The Blessing Nurses Alumni Association was established in 1900. It was formed to help graduates in need, to uphold a code of ethics, to promote the high standards of nursing, and to encourage fellowship among the members. The Blessing Hospital Alumni Association joined the National Association of Graduate Nurses, which became the American Nurses Association. A register of graduates was kept in the hospital office for private duty purposes. The 1909 Annual Report began listing the graduates and the position they held. Several were employed at the Soldier's and Sailor's Home, Woodland Home, and the Visiting Nurse Association. 

Two Blessing Nursing Students to Receive Sarah & Friends Scholarship



The 2018 Sarah & Friends fundraising gala in Quincy will help further the education of two Blessing-Rieman College of Nursing & Health Sciences students. The students will receive scholarships from the proceeds of the annual fundraiser.

Sarah & Friends is an organization founded in memory of Sarah Christine Birsic, who lost her life in 2012 as the result of a tragic accident. The goal of the organization, founded by her parents, Dr. William and Kathleen Birsic and Sarah's friends, is to support young women in need and help them reach their full potential.

"We are incredibly honored to be chosen by the Sarah & Friends organization," said Brenda Beshears, PhD, RN, President and Chief Executive Officer, Blessing-Rieman College of Nursing & Health

Sciences. "Our students are blessed to be part of this community, one that recognizes the need of young women attending college to better their futures."

This year's Sarah & Friends gala will be held on Saturday, September 15, 2018. Titled "The Shim Sham Room: A Speakeasy Fundraising Event," it will be held at the Stock House at Dick Brothers Brewery, 929 York Street, Quincy. Hurdland Woman Named Nurse of the Year by Blessing Alumni Association

Esther (Scheuermann) Plowman of Hurdland was named the Blessing Nurses Alumni Association Nurse of the Year at the organization's annual banquet. Plowman is a graduate of the Blessing Hospital School of Nursing Class of 1959. She was nominated for the award by three fellow class members.

After graduation, Plowman worked at Blessing Hospital for two years and then at the hospital in Carthage, IL, until 1979. In 1979, she and her husband moved to Knox County, MO, where Plowman led the formation of the Knox County Health Department.

Her nomination stated, in part, "Esther has undoubtedly left a lasting legacy, surpassing no other individual who has ever been employed by the Knox County Health Department."

During her career, Plowman was also employed by the Mark Twain Behavioral Health Board where she covered nine counties in northeast Missouri. While there, she received a certificate of appreciation for instituting the Missouri Swine Flu program. She was on the Northeast Missouri Caring Committee as a board member and was the Truman State University Nurse Mentor in 1998-1999.

EXPLORE NURSING

BRCN hosted two Explore Nursing day camps this summer for high school students from 15 to 17 years of age. A total of 24 students participated this year—12 on June 12th and 12 on June 29th.

BLESSING-RIEMAN WINS VENTILATOR

The luck of the draw is helping Blessing-Rieman College of Nursing & Health Sciences students be better prepared to care for the youngest patients.

Mark Lotz, Program Director, Blessing-Rieman Respiratory Care program, won a special ventilator while attending the 2018 American Association for Respiratory Care (AARC) World Congress. Lotz was selected as the recipient of a Drager Babylog VN500 neonatal ventilator in a random drawing. The ventilator is used to help premature babies breathe. It is valued at \$12,500.



"These ventilators are so expensive that most respiratory care education programs cannot afford to buy them," said Lotz.

Drager Inc. holds the drawing for a ventilator to be donated to respiratory care programs during the AARC education section meeting so that students can get hands-on experience with the equipment.

The Drager Babylog VN500 is capable of providing the latest modes of ventilation to even the smallest and most critically ill neonate. It will allow the Blessing-Rieman's respiratory care students to practice adjusting settings and try different breathing modes in order to prepare them to participate in Neonatal Intensive Care Unit clinical experiences. In addition, nursing students will be able to participate in simulations designed to help them understand and be comfortable with the care necessary for individuals on a ventilator.

"One of the reasons so many premature babies survive today is because of the development of these ventilators which are used to support respiration until the baby's lungs are developed enough to allow normal breathing," observed Lotz. "The reason neonatal ventilators are so important is because premature babies have very small lungs that can easily be damaged by pressure of ventilators designed for adults."

Respiratory therapists care for patients who have trouble breathing—for example, from a chronic respiratory disease, such as asthma or emphysema. Their patients range from premature infants with undeveloped lungs to elderly patients who have diseased lungs. They also provide emergency care to patients suffering from heart attacks, drowning, or shock.

FACULTY NEWS

An article written by **Deborah Race**, Associate Professor, and Margaret Williams was published in the February 2018 issue of *CIN Plus*. The article is titled "Digital Audio Feedback Technology: Nursing Students' Perspectives." Their research was based on use of audio feedback in a clinical group of junior nursing students and a research theory course at BRCN.

Kimi Yuchs, Assistant Professor, presented at the 24th Annual Nursing Research Conference: Old Problems-New Evidence at Memorial Medical Center in Springfield, IL, on March 26, 2018. She did a podium presentation on her doctoral work titled *Caring for the Poor: Analysis of Nurses' Attitudes Toward Patients from the Culture of Poverty*. She is a DNP student at the University of Southern Indiana.

Linda Burke, Assistant Professor, Susan McReynolds, Assistant Professor, Marianne Schmitt, Assistant Professor, and Lori **Sprenger**, Associate Professor, accompanied 23 students on an experiential learning trip to the Dominican Republic in March 2018. Among other things, the group visited a children's hospital and a physical rehabilitation center, talked with students at the Nursing Technical School of San José de Ocoa, visited a school for children with special needs and played with the children. interacted with the residents at the Elder Home in San José de Ocoa, brought gifts to and spent quality time with the children at a girls' orphanage in Baní, toured the San José de Ocoa Hospital where they had the opportunity to ask

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questions about what it is like being a nurse in the Dominican Republic, and worked in a rural clinic where they measured height, weight, and blood pressures and checked blood glucose levels.

Lacey Petersen, MSN, RN, Assistant Professor


